How did people vote in the last general election?

Teachers' Notes

The KS3 citizenship programme of study states that all students should have opportunities to explore... key features of parliamentary democracy and government in the constituent parts of the UK and at local level, including voting and elections.

Prerequisite knowledge needed:

Calculate one number as a percentage of another. Calculating a percentage increase/ decrease.

Initial discussion

How many of the class know the name of their member of parliament? Which constituency do they live in? Talk about the *first past the post* voting system operated in the UK.

Main part:

See questions on the attached worksheet. The sheet asks students to compare the percentage of seats with the percentage of votes gained in both the UK as a whole and England. The results of the election in Maidstone and the Weald are also analysed, including turnout figures..

Pleneary:

Discuss the consequences of the first past the post voting system. Briefly explain how proportional representation operates. Why do some people want proportional representation for general elections in the UK? Why do some parties prefer first past the post?

4) The election results for the Maidstone and the Weald constituency were as follows:

Every candidate that stands in the general election has to pay a deposit (£500). The deposit is returned to the candidate if they get more than 5% of the vote. Did any of the candidates in the Maidstone and the Weald constituency lose their deposit?

5) The number of people who voted in the Maidstone constituency in 2005 was 48,755.

The number of people who were eligible to vote was 74096.

Turnout in the whole of the United Kingdom was 61.3%.
